Area 3 Meeting, 21 March 2015

Area 3 is one of the seven Areas of the Assembly, comprising New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware, and Washington.

Area 3 is not the final decider of any issues except those internal to itself. Two decisions internal to Area 3 were the election of Joe Napoli as Area 3 Representative and Bill Greenberg as Deputy Area 3 Representative, both from New Jersey.

Area 3 endorsed the following motions on their way to the Assembly which meets at the APA Annual meeting in Toronto, 15-17 May.

Endorsed by Area 3:

1] A motion valuing the option of involuntary outpatient treatment. About five states still do not allow such, including Maryland.

2] A motion on firearms and mental illness. The intent of the APA should be to disregard the inevitable criticism that will come from those who oppose everything related to firearm possession and, at the same time, not offend legitimate hunters with Position Statements that may label the APA as uninformed. The intent of the APA should be to stand for the proper balance between responsible exercise of individual rights on one hand, and, on the other hand, legitimate public health and safety concerns.



clinical significance distress or impairment in social, occupational, or other important areas of functioning” of the DSM-5 criteria sets [about 70% of the criteria sets].

4] WPS motion to explore the removal of the arbitrariness of criteria sets from future DSMs. For example simply have “psychotic disorder” for brief psychotic disorder, schizophreniform disorder, and schizophrenia, and not have the patient pass through two diagnoses until they reach the six month mark for schizophrenia.

Discussed in some detail, but no action was taken on a proposed reorganization of the Assembly which, if passed, would require WPS’s Membership to exceed 900 to obtain four representatives. We are now at about 852 and three representatives.

Many reports were sent to the Area 3 meeting including Dr. Crowley’s Area 3 Trustee Report, Dr. Ratner’s American Society of Adolescent Psychiatry report, and several of Dr. Sorel’s initiatives. There was insufficient time to discuss any of these other than Dr. Crowley’s and Dr. Ratner’s, the latter which included an announcement that the Adolescent Society will be having another of its clinically-useful meetings in New York City, March 26-29. 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### APA Urges Elimination of Part 4 of Maintenance of Certification

APA President Paul Summergrad, M.D., and CEO and Medical Director Saul Levin, M.D, M.P.A., have recommended to the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology (ABPN) that Part 4 of the Maintenance of Certification (MOC) Program be eliminated. Part 4 is the “Improvement in Medical Practice” section, also known as Performance in Practice, or PIP.

The action, which was in response to APA members’ significant concerns over this portion of the MOC program, was taken in a [letter](#) sent to ABPN President and CEO Larry R. Faulkner, M.D., yesterday. The letter was the result of a motion, spurred by the Assembly Executive Committee and made at the Board of Trustees meeting this past weekend in Arlington, Va., reflecting concerns over the limited evidence base

for Part 4.

The ABPN is an independent board that operates under criteria established by the American Board of Medical Specialties (ABMS). Thus, APA is urging the ABPN to support APA's position and advocate to the ABMS for the elimination of the Part 4 requirement.

The ABPN MOC program currently consists of four sections: Part 1, Professional Standing (licensure); Part 2, Lifelong Learning and Self-Assessment; Part 3, Cognitive Expertise (certification/recertification examinations); and Part 4, Improvement in Medical Practice (Performance in Practice-PIP).

"APA members have found Part 4 to be onerous, cumbersome, and not meaningful," wrote Summergrad and Levin. "While we very much appreciate ABPN leadership's efforts to create alternative pathways for meeting this requirement, neither our members nor the APA Board of Trustees support the continuation of Part 4 of MOC."

The Board also established a joint Board-Assembly work group to evaluate the broad issue of maintenance of certification in psychiatry and its relationship to maintenance of state licensure and other accrediting bodies.

APA is not the only medical specialty to question the value of certain MOC requirements. The American Board of Internal Medicine, after input from its medical specialty members, announced last month that it was making substantial changes to its MOC requirements, including the suspension of Part 4.

In a statement released to APA members yesterday about its letter to the ABPN, Summergrad wrote, "We highly value our collaborative relationship with the ABPN and will work with them, other groups, and, of course, our members to resolve the widespread concern about these issues."

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### APA Fights for Mental Health Parity as ACA Marks Fifth Anniversary



On the fifth anniversary of the signing of the Affordable Care Act (ACA), APA continues working to ensure that the promise of the reform law — which mandates mental health and substance use service as an essential health benefit and compliance with the federal parity law in newly formed health exchanges — is realized.

In a statement released today, five years after he signed the watershed legislation into law, President Obama said the ACA is working.

“After five years of the Affordable Care Act, more than 16 million uninsured Americans have gained the security of health insurance—an achievement that has cut the ranks of the uninsured by nearly one third,” Obama said. “These aren’t just numbers. Because of this law, there are parents who can finally afford to take their kids to the doctor. There are families who no longer risk losing their home or savings just because someone gets sick. ... There are Americans who, without this law, would not be alive today.”

But the ACA faces a potentially fateful Supreme Court challenge to certain provisions of the law. And a recent study in *Psychiatric Services* found inconsistencies with the federal parity law in the benefits summaries for mental health and substance abuse services of health plans in two state-run health exchanges. Those inconsistencies—in quantifiable treatment limits (cost-sharing, deductibles, treatment limits) and nonquantifiable treatment limits (prior authorization and other strategies for restricting treatment use)—may either reflect actual non-compliance with the law or an effort by plans to dissuade potential consumers who expect to use mental health services from enrolling in a plan.

APA is pursuing a multifaceted strategy of education and advocacy, as well as legal action against companies that fail to comply with the law. As part of that strategy, APA created the [Mental Health Parity Poster](#) and is encouraging psychiatrists and other mental health clinicians to post it in waiting rooms or clinics to educate patients about their legal right to equal treatment. More than 100,000 posters have been distributed, with district branches (DBs) and other associations and hospitals cobranding them. A Spanish-language version is being developed.

### **Maria A. Oquendo, M.D., Elected APA President-Elect**

**ARLINGTON, Va.** —The membership of the American Psychiatric Association has chosen Maria Oquendo, M.D., as its next president-elect. Oquendo is currently residency training director at the New York State Psychiatric Institute and Columbia University, where she started as a community psychiatrist. She is professor and vice chair for education at Columbia University, conducting research on treatment and neurobiology of mood disorders, suicide and global mental health.

Oquendo has held several leadership roles at APA. She is secretary of the Board of Trustees and chairs APA’s Conflict of Interest Committee. She formerly chaired APA’s SAMHSA Fellowship Selection Committee and served as associate editor of the *American Journal of Psychiatry*.

Oquendo also serves as vice president of the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, is past president of the American Society of Hispanic Psychiatry, and serves on the American College of Neuropsychopharmacology’s Council and the National Institute of Mental Health’s National Advisory Mental Health Council.

“I am honored and grateful to have been elected to lead APA,” Oquendo said. “This is an exciting time to practice psychiatry. Our knowledge base has grown exponentially in the last decades, and we still have the privilege of forming close therapeutic alliances with our patients and

their families, offering relief for suffering. Yet, APA has much work to do.”

Among Oquendo’s priorities as APA president, when she assumes that role in May 2016, are to:

- Secure a key role for psychiatrists as health care reform is implemented while ensuring high quality care for all, particularly persons with the most severe mental illnesses
- Pursue equitable reimbursement and true parity for psychiatric care
- Secure robust federal funding for education and research, coordinating efforts with advocacy groups
- Strengthen collaboration with psychiatric subspecialties and primary care, and
- Pursue active communication with all members.

“Importantly, I believe APA can continue to strive for diversity at all levels of the organization, including representation from women, minority psychiatrists, international medical graduates, and LGBT members. I hope to harness my experience in teaching and mentoring to engage our trainee members and early career psychiatrists. They are our future,” noted Oquendo.

Her term as president-elect of the APA, confirmed by the APA Board of Trustees on Saturday, March 14, will begin in May at the conclusion of the APA Annual Meeting, when president-elect Renée Binder, M.D., begins her one-year term as president.

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### **APA Urges Senate Passage of the Medicare Formula Fix, Repeal of SGR**

ARLINGTON, Va . The American Psychiatric Association (APA) applauds today’s bipartisan House vote on legislation that would repeal the flawed Sustainable Growth Rate (SGR) formula for Medicare physician payment rates. The APA urges quick Senate action on the bill.

This legislation, SGR Repeal and Medicare Provider Payment Modernization Act of 2015 (H.R. 2), would repeal the SGR and establish a series of payment reforms under Medicare focusing on quality instead of volume. Future payments would be determined by a doctor’s participation in integrated care settings, health outcomes and quality measures.

If Congress does not act by March 31, physician Medicare payments will be cut by 21 percent. For the past several years, rather than repealing the SGR, Congress has instituted a series of “patches” that have effectively postponed scheduled cuts to doctor reimbursement rates.

“We support this long-overdue reform of the Medicare payment formula and elimination of the SGR,” said APA President Paul Summergrad, M.D. “The physician payment system needs to be stabilized for the sake of our patients and for our physicians who care for them.”

APA joins a number of other medical organizations in supporting the legislation, including the American Medical Association and the American Hospital Association. The APA has long advocated, along with the rest of the medical community, for a repeal of the SGR and a strong emphasis on policy reforms that tie future Medicare physician payments to quality measurement and encouragement of integrated care.

“APA strongly supports the bipartisan legislation the House passed and will continue to partner with the AMA and the other medical societies to urge all Senators to vote yes to send the bill to President Obama, who has already said he would sign it,” said APA CEO and Medical Director Saul Levin, M.D., M.P.A.


