Presidential Perspective

"Being Prepared!"

Our colleagues in New York recently were surprised when quickly-generated legislation became law and it provides a lesson we should learn from: we need to be prepared for legislative efforts to bring mental health into the efforts to protect our communities from gun violence. Certainly APA needs to lead in developing any national approaches, but to the extent that various states and localities may move ahead and contemplate unique requirements on psychiatrists, district branches need to think through the issues and be prepared so we can influence the law affecting our work. The problematic requirement in the NY law (which was one of several made to combat gun violence) was that psychiatrists are mandated to report potentially violent patients to a central registry. That would be the reporting of a degree of violence, or risk of violence, that would seem to be less than, or just different from, that seen in mandatory reporting of suspicion of child maltreatment or that of commitment or that of the "Tarasoff" duty. Besides the lack of clarity of the process, the inherent problem is the sudden imposition of a new mandate to reveal patient information. The law does provide an out: no reporting is necessary if the psychiatrist judges the patient to not be of risk for violence. Are you reading this column and saying "what?!" to yourself out of confusion and shock?

Therein is my point: legislation of this gravity and of such consequence for psychiatrists (and other clinicians) cannot simply be a product of policy-makers or legislators, and unless we want to be surprised, we should spend time in our chapters thinking about what we want and what we don't want as well as preparing to explain to community leaders what ways mental health systems and clinicians can help and

the ways in which they cannot. Our New York colleagues are resigned to advocating for fixes and adjustments and clarifications to this law, we'd prefer to help our communities get it right the first time.

From the Editor

In the next several issues of WPS e-NEWS, I plan to use this column to briefly let you know about several organizations in which I am involved and that I believe will be of interest to our membership. Global mental health is a hugely important topic in psychiatry today and will be highlighted in the upcoming first issue of the new WPS e-magazine "Washington Psychiatrist."



The Chinese American Psychoanalytic Alliance (CAPA) is a non-profit that was incorporated in 2006 and offers training and treatment to mental health professionals in China over Skype and ooVoo. CAPA members consist of about 400 mostly American (but also Australian, Canadian, South and Central American, European and Israeli) mental health therapists. Most are psychoanalysts but many, like me, are analytically-oriented psychotherapists. CAPA has a Basic two-year and an Advanced three -year training program for Chinese mental health professionals in 18 cities. Since 2009, there has been a two week and a three week tour of several Chinese cities for lecturing, supervising and providing treatment.

CAPA was started by Elise Snyder, MD who has continued to do an outstanding job holding CAPA together and moving it along.

I've been treating a Chinese psychiatrist in weekly psychotherapy for over 3 years on Skype and I have found it to be an extremely rewarding experience. Treatment and supervision are offered at fees commensurate with the Chinese economy, i.e. between \$10 and \$30 per session, such that this is in part a labor of love. In addition I teach a five week course to a class of 10 students on "Analytic Listening."

Since taking over the WPS account in 2007, we have put in a system of reporting which includes standard financial reports, including Profit/Loss and Balance Sheet reports at each board meeting, along with comparative reporting against the budget.

contracted for its first outside audit by a CPA firm to cover the 2011-2012 fiscal year. We are very pleased to report that the auditors presented their report to the board at its January meeting and the audit and management letter were both "clean" (meaning no reportable problems). This is highly unusual for an organization's first audit.

While everything is financially in good order, we are implementing some changes that will bring WPS in full compliance the highest standards of nonprofit accounting. We have changed the WPS fiscal year to a calendar year to match the APA fiscal year. This change will enable us to move to "true accrual" accounting. Previously, we have used "modified accrual" accounting because dues were recorded as received.

Another change on the fiscal front is that we have revised the WPS chart of accounts to differentiate between "administrative" and "program" expenses. One area where this is of particular importance is the allocation of management fees. While some management fees are associated with administrative functions like accounting and database management, a very significant percentage of management time is spent on member communications, committee support, CME programs, and events. Our new model will allow our books and budget to reflect the true cost of events, for example.

We had a great response to the call for nominations for the board, as well as interest in working on WPS committees. WPS is a vibrant organization with lots of activities. Whether your interest is CME, membership, public affairs, awards, ethics, mentoring, finance, or chapter activities, we have ways that you can become involved. Should DSM-5 Be Free to APA Members?

The Washington Psychiatric Society Board of Directors has taken the position that the DSM-5 should be provided free to each Member of the APA. The motion was based on a number of concepts:

1. APA is both a Membership organization and a business. Both are important, but Membership should be the priority.
2. Providing each APA Members with a free copy of DSM makes sense, as the APA should conceive of the DSM as a product of the whole organization. Free, not reduced cost of 25%, adequately captures the need for all the Members to share in APA products that are important to all Members.

Restated, it is important that Membership implies one is part of the organization that produces the DSMs. We want APA Members to sense, correctly, that it is their product.

AJP is free to Members. DSM-5 **content** is more a product of APA Members and APA's governance than AJP. There is no reason AJP should be free to Members and DSM-5 should not.

3. Providing each Member with a DSM underlies the importance of all psychiatrists having a DSM as a foundation of their practice.

4. Providing all Members with a current DSM would be a valuable Member Benefit. Since 1997, there had been a significant decline in APA Membership. While no one action will reverse this downward spiral, providing a free DSM to all Members will add to the value of membership.

5. Members receiving DSM-5 free would decrease any impact of, might even preempt, mischievous efforts to encourage psychiatrists to forget DSM-5 and instead use CMS's ICD-9-CM [which some will say is virtually free and more legally official than DSM-5].

As to this investment in Membership of the APA, hard to estimate as we do not know how many Members of APA will want to pay \$160 or so for DSM-5. We are guessing that this investment in Membership will come to about \$5,000,000.

On the basis of the above, WPS asked that the APA Membership Committee consider the following actions:

1. That DSM-5 be free to all Members, either the book or the electronic version depending on the Member's preference.
2. After about a year, that this policy be evaluated as to impact on APA's membership.

On Friday, January 25, at the Embassy of Canada, Cdr. David Wilcox MD, Health Services Attaché of the Embassy of Canada, organized a half day lectures on "Regional Health Services."

The WPS Wellstone Award was presented to Grand Challenges Canada for their \$ 20 million investment in global mental health research and programming. This represents the single largest donation to a global mental healthcare effort. It is the largest investment in projects focused on developing and delivering innovative approaches to mental health treatment and care in Low and Middle income Countries [LMIC]

In his speech, Cdr. Wilcox also mentioned the WPS Embassy Disaster Preparedness Project, and questions followed during lunch.

WPS is grateful to Commander Wilcox for spotlighting WPS in his presentation to the international community.

Jeffrey S. Akman has been chosen to serve as the vice president for health affairs and the dean of the Goerge Washington University School of Medicine and Health Sciences (SMHS). He will lead the academic and research mission of SMPS and will be named the Walter A. Bloedorn Chair of Administrative Medicine.

E. James Lieberman, MD spoke on November 13 at The Center for the History of Psychology at the University of Akron. His topic is "Sigmund Freud, Otto Rank, and Oedipus" - based on *The Letters of Sigmund Freud and Otto Rank: Inside Psychoanalysis* (2012) which I co-edited. On Jan. 23 I will discuss the book at OLLI (Osher Lifelong Learning Institute) at American University. Dr. Lieberman is a Clinical Professor of Psychiatry, Emeritus, at the George Washington University School of Medicine.

Medical Student Senior Elective in HIV Psychiatry

The American Psychiatric Association established this program in 2004 to provide an opportunity for 4th year minority medical students to participate in a one-month clinical or research elective in HIV psychiatry.

With improvements in HIV drug therapy, there is a burgeoning demand to treat the mental health needs of those living longer with the disease. People with HIV have a higher incidence of mental health problems than the general population and, conversely, people with serious mental illness are more at risk for contracting HIV. HIV attacks the brain, causing inflammation and tissue deterioration. Infection of the brain also can lead to clinical depression, mild or moderate thinking problems, and trouble with memory and focus. Unfortunately, the mental health needs of people living with HIV/AIDS are too often overlooked.

Undoubtedly, future physicians need to develop a working knowledge of HIV-related psychiatric and neuropsychiatric issues. The purpose of the *Medical Student Elective in HIV Psychiatry* is to foster the participation of medical students (particularly from racial and ethnic minorities) in HIV-related care and research and provide them with a means of obtaining essential HIV-related mental health training through an integrated approach to patient care.

Description of the Project

This September *Elective in HIV Psychiatry* begins with intensive two-day training in Washington, DC. Topics range from neuropsychiatric complications of HIV, somatic complaints, and mood disorders to special patient populations, including people with substance use disorders and/or those suffering from severe mental illnesses. Training modalities include a combination of lectures, role playing, case vignettes, and first-person accounts through interviews with HIV-positive people. Students then travel to training sites for their clinical or research experience for the month of September.

To date, sixty-four students have completed the full month-long elective. Prior sites have included: Cambridge Health Alliance/Zinberg Clinic; The New York Presbyterian Hospital at Columbia University; The New York-Presbyterian Hospital Cornell University Center for Special Studies

(CSS); Emory University/Grady Infectious Disease Program; Howard University; University of Pittsburgh Medical Center; University of Cincinnati; University of Miami, Stanford University, Beth Israel, Vanderbilt, and the University of South Florida (for a research elective in HIV Neuroimmunology in Psychiatry.) Tentative dates for the elective are August 23 to September 20.

The application deadline is March 31, 2013 with selections to be announced in late April. Go [here](#) to access applications.

MCDANIEL, Dr. Ellen Garb



Dr. Ellen Garb McDaniel, former Associate Dean for Admissions at the University of Maryland Medical School, long term faculty member (UMMS, GW & Georgetown Medical Schools), & prominent forensic psychiatrist, died peacefully at her home in Highland, MD, on 01/03/2013 following a courageous battle with cancer.
